### **Children's Ministry Summer Schedule**

Our Formation will be held from 9 – 9:30 am. The first Sunday of the month will be a children's live Zoom gathering (except for July 4th). Officiant: We pray for all who have asked for our prayers and for those who have no one to pray for them. God of new life,

**People: Hear our prayer.**

Officiant: In recognition of Juneteenth and the anniversary of the announcement of freedom to enslaved peoples in 1865 in Texas, let us pray together for the ongoing work of justice and liberation:

**Almighty God, who created us in your image: Grant us grace fearlessly to contend against evil and to make no peace with oppression; and, that we may reverently use our freedom, help us to employ it in the maintenance of justice in our communities and among the nations, to the glory of your holy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.**

Officiant: Great Spirit God, we give you thanks for another day on this earth. We give you thanks for this day to enjoy the compassionate goodness of you, our Creator. We acknowledge with one mind our respect and gratefulness to all the sacred cycle of life. Bind us together in the circle of compassion to embrace all living creatures and one another. **Amen**

We praise you that in Jesus Christ you make known to us the wonder and richness of our humanity.
