
Ezekiel 47:6 - 12 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

The Sermon

the Rev. Joseph H. Hensley, Jr.

The Nicene Creed We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Upon our efforts to resist temptation send a blessing, O God. Remove from us the will to control the earth and to waste it away. Give us the will to sacrifice for the generations to come.

The celebrant invites those with gardening supplies and tools to raise them up.

Celebrant: We praise you, O God, for the richness of your bounty, for the beauty of your earth. Bless these tools and the hands that wield them, that we might learn from one another and from your Creation how you loved us first and how to love one another; let a new spring of faith well up and overflow; bless the fruits of the harvest, that all might be drawn into your life; in the Name of the most holy, glorious, and undivided Trinity. **Amen**.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth. But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world.
