Leader 2: Upon our efforts to resist temptation send a blessing, O God. Remove from us the will to control the earth and to waste it away. Give us the will to sacrifice for the generations to come.

People: Hear us, O God.

The celebrant invites those with gardening supplies and tools to raise them up.

We praise you that in Jesus Christ you make known to us the wonder and richness of our humanity. We give thanks for his life-giving love, for his healing touch, for his vulnerability and for his gentleness.

Before he gave up his life, he shared his humanity, his flesh and blood with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks for it, broke it and gave it to them saying:

"This is my own body given for you. Do this to remember me."

So too after they had eaten, he took wine, gave thanks for it and gave it to them saying:

"This is my blood, poured out in love for you. Do this to remember me."

So we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

For those receiving the Sacrament, hold out your hands over each other, palms up. If you require a gluten-free wafer, hold your hands palms down. You may sip the wine from the chalice or simply touch the base. For those receiving a blessing instead, please cross your arms over your chest. After, please return to your pew by the side aisle.
